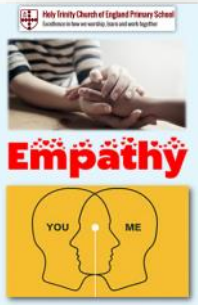
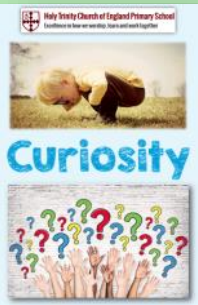

This year we are asking you to donate food items to the Brixton Soup Kitchen, this is a community space for homeless people or people in desperate need.

The Soup Kitchen provides food, drink and companionship in a warm and friendly environment on a weekly basis. Since opening in 2013 they have served over 25,000 meals either eaten on site or distributed during food drop offs and outreach sessions.

Children are to bring their items to the Maddox Centre by Wednesday 29th September 2021.

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Last week, Holy Trinity participated in Jeans for Genes Day to raise funds to support children who are suffering from genetic disorders.

During the week, we learned about genetic disorders, such as Sickle Cell Anaemia and Brittle Bones. We learned how these diseases affect children and explored ways that we could show them empathy.

On Friday, we wore jeans to raise funds to go towards supporting these children with equipment or specialist care. A total of £132.40 was raised on the day. A big thank you to all our children and parents.

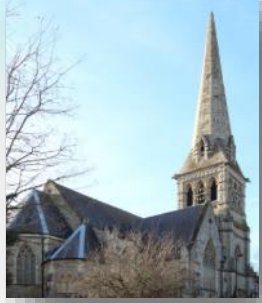

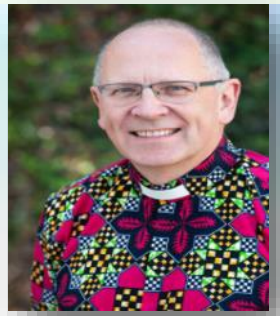

Do you know what I heard this week?

ONE BILLION CHILDREN are at extremely high risk from the impacts of climate change. That was the shocking revelation of a report published last month by Unicef.

Imagine ALL the people living in the UK standing together somewhere in the world, and then imagine twenty of those massive groups of people – that's a billion.

Now reimagine all of them as children. It's actually NEARLY HALF OF ALL THE CHILDREN IN THE WORLD! All those children, right now, are at extremely high risk from the impacts of climate change because these effects of climate change are already beginning to happen.

What are some of these effects?

- At one extreme is flooding – from the seas and rivers.*
- At the other extreme is heatwave and drought. In the midst of this is an increase in fatal disease like malaria as the insects carrying it move to new places with the heat.*
- And through everything is the dangers of pollution, in the air, water, and earth.*

At least one in three children live in places with at least three of these effects. Yet the 33 highest risk countries emit just 9% of global CO₂. By contrast, of the 10 countries that emit nearly 70% of global CO₂, only one is classed as “extremely high risk.”

It's really unfair isn't it?

Who are these children?

Each of them has a name. Each of them wakes up, smiles, laughs perhaps, learns how to play, learns how to do their chores, cries sometimes, looks after their siblings, tries to sleep at night. They are just like our children.

Perhaps we should think of them as our children – or our brothers and sisters.

That might help us be a bit more determined to make a difference for our planet.

Do you use Netflix?

Netflix is hugely popular across all ages but there have been concerns in relation to age ratings and the type of content that is recommended to viewers.

Like many other services, Netflix uses algorithms to determine what you might like to watch based on viewing history, what you have liked etc.

Since last year, Netflix has been working with the BBFC and 100% of the content on Netflix is now age-rated to BBFC classification standards.

It is the first UK streaming service to accomplish this.

This is good news but for it to work you must set up a child account and choose the maturity ratings.
