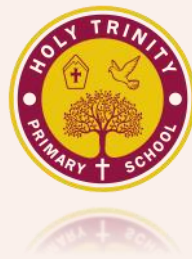

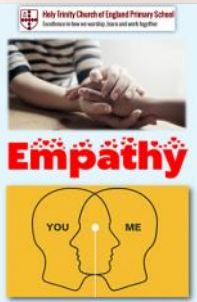
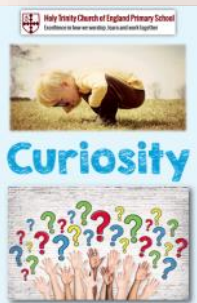

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This Sunday is Remembrance Sunday. Remembrance Sunday was started after the Second World War. Before then, they remembered the end of the First World War on November 11th – which is called Armistice Day – the day when all the soldiers of the First World War laid down their weapons or “arms”.

So when they moved it to “Remembrance Sunday” they were deliberately trying to include more than one war. How many wars can you think of in 10 seconds? Try it! Time yourself!

There have been literally *hundreds of thousands* of wars throughout history. But if I want to include people in Remembrance Sunday I’m going to think of some people who didn’t completely die during war – but a bit of them died inside themselves.

I think of my friend Helen. She wasn’t at home when the bomb hit her house and killed her whole family. Her boyfriend was a pilot, but he was killed in battle. Eventually, with no-one close to her, she became a nurse with the Red Cross and spent her whole life helping people in the worst war zones.

She had no country to call her own, and when she retired, she came to England. But she *hated* Winston Churchill because he ordered the bombs to be dropped on her old family home in Germany.

I think of my Uncle Arthur. He was a little child when the Nazis were bombing London. He had to be sent away to the countryside where didn’t know anyone. Can you imagine? He was seriously mentally ill for the rest of his life partly from those early days of trauma.

I think of my Grandad, Georgie. He was really high up in the RAF, and he was there watching, when the Italian Dictator Mussolini surrendered. When I was little I wanted him to tell me about flying in those old aeroplanes – but he never, ever wanted to talk about it.

For 20 years he hardly said a word, but day after day sat at his desk typing books into braille, which was a way blind people could read them. He just wanted to make up for things and devote himself to doing good.

War is so horrific that almost everyone involved has a bit of themselves that dies inside – even if they go on living.

So I’m going to include those people this Remembrance Sunday.
