


- A sponsored 'readathon' where our children have raised money for our school library by reading as many books as they can in two weeks.



This Wednesday was Ash Wednesday.

The church ritual of smearing a mixture of ash and oil in the shape of a cross on the forehead didn't begin until the IIth Century, but amazingly, now - worldwide - it's one of the church's busiest days. In fact in recent years, some churches have been going out on the streets offering ashing to anyone who wants it. Hundreds of people - even those without much Christian faith - receive this strange sign just above their eyes.

Why?

Something about this sign resonates.

First, it's an action. Quite often, religions provide words or sentences which people can choose to believe or not. The church defines its creed. But ashing is an action with minimal words, and so the content of what it means is very much up to the individual recipient's thoughts.

Second, it's very bodily. There is direct bodily contact; a hand touches your forehead; it marks the start of Lent, when you might fast, which is also a bodily activity. Bodily activities touch us at our deepest level; we sense there's a meaning even if we couldn't translate it into words.

Third, it's the beginning of an annual ritual - fasting for Lent. There are lots of ways you can make the season of Lent a Christian spiritual journey. But loads of people simply see it as their annual detox - along, now, with "dry January".

Fourth, the words themselves speak sombrely of our mortality: "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Many of us associate these words with funerals and particularly burials: "ashes to ashes, dust to dust." In some ways they can be troubling words, but at a deeper level they bring peace because through them we are all levelled before God. All our striving, all our ambition, all our successes and failures fall away.

Fifth, ashing connects with many current themes in our world. For some, as it ushers in a period of fasting, it connects with the wider ecological question of whether we should eat less meat. For others, through acknowledging our mortal weakness we connect with our feelings of helplessness as, for example, with the war in Ukraine.
